[Library Refresher](#)

When looking for books on the shelves in our library, the spine labels are there to help you find what you need. You probably all remember the Dewey Decimal System from your childhood libraries but don't think you have to memorize any of it. The nice thing about the system is that it puts materials in numerical order. If you can count, you can find a book easily. Since the system takes you from 000 to 999, anything in between is just an address for each book. A book whose call number is **350.74** will come before a book whose call number is **363.2**. The three letters underneath the number help to further identify the book, either by the author's name or, in some cases, the title of the book. If two books have the same number, the letters help to put the books in order alphabetically (e.g., **350.74 GER** will come **before 350.74 SAM**).

Please remember that books should be checked out at the circulation desk by me. However, if I

am not available, there is a checkout log at the desk for you to fill in key information. As a courtesy, please consider following up with a call or an e-mail if you check out an item that way. When a book is returned, it should be brought back to the circulation desk rather than put back on the shelf.

Don't be intimidated by Mr. Dewey and his system!
